Boeing Funds Young Entrepreneurship Program

St. Louis, Mo. (Oct. 4, 2018) – Starting December 1st 2018, The Boeing Company will begin funding a new program for young entrepreneurs in college. The program based from Boeing’s new start-up team, HorizonX, which focuses on business development, disruption, and venture capital. The program will be open to college students from any school or program who have an idea that pertains to the future of business in aviation, mobility, or autonomy. There will be a contest held yearly in the winter and winners will receive a \$10,000 prize each, as well as the chance to even generate their idea with the help of a Boeing team.

Team lead for the HorizonX program, Mike Smith states, “We believe this program will help encourage more college students from various backgrounds to get interested in disruption and innovation, which is what we are all about.” Boeing will offer runner-up prizes in addition to first place and will begin applications in January. Boeing has already received hundreds of applications early and plans to have a panel of members from different sectors and companies judge the ideas.
